

CHAPTER 9

FUTURE PROSPECTS AND PROBLEMS

The economy has recorded a strong expansion in the current year, with record foodgrains production and an improvement in industrial performance. Prospects for 1984-85 are also favourable. Agricultural growth is likely to come down to a normal level next year but the industrial sector should continue to improve and show a higher growth rate in 1984-85. Infrastructure performance has also improved in recent months and, given a reasonable monsoon, the economy is well set for healthy growth in GDP in 1984-85. The price situation at present is a cause for concern but with the various counter inflationary measures already taken, and the expectation of expanded supplies from both agriculture and industry, some easing of inflationary pressure in the months ahead can be expected.

9.2 The balance of payments has also shown considerable improvement, with a reduction in the trade gap for the second year in succession, and an increase in foreign exchange reserves. These developments amply vindicate the external adjustment strategy followed by the Government in the Sixth Plan period which focused on a variety of steps to bring the current account deficit under control over a period of time while relying upon temporary recourse to IMF financing under the EFF arrangement. The expected improvement in the country's balance of payments has occurred faster than originally expected, and the Government has decided to refrain from making further drawings from the EFF after the current third year's programme is completed.

9.3 On the whole, the country can expect to end the Sixth Plan period with a substantial measure of achievement. GDP growth in the five-year period (1980-81 to 1984-85) is likely to be fairly close to the Sixth Plan target of 5.2 per cent. This would be all the more remarkable for having been accomplished in an exceptionally difficult external environment when most developing countries have experienced distinctly low rates of growth. Although in relation to targets there are shortfalls in several sectors, there is no doubt that substantial expansion of capacity would have been achieved in critical areas such as power, irrigation, coal, railways, cement and fertilisers by the end of the Plan period. Power generating capacity is likely to increase from 28,500 megawatts to about 43,000 megawatts, the area under irrigation from 52 million hectares to about 66 million hectares and the capacity for nitrogenous fertilisers production from 3.9 million tonnes to 5.8 million tonnes. In crude oil production, one of the most critical areas from the point of view of both energy and the balance of payments, the country has already

exceeded the levels of production envisaged in the Sixth Plan. Growth combined with schemes specially oriented towards employment generation and poverty alleviation has enabled the country to secure a wider distribution of the gains of development. These objectives were at the heart of the Revised 20-Point Programme which has been vigorously implemented.

9.4 These developments provide ground for satisfaction, but they should not lead to complacency. The economy faces increasingly difficult challenges in the years ahead, and as the country approaches the start of the Seventh Plan period it will be necessary to devise systems and strategies to meet these challenges if the record of progress of the Sixth Plan is to be sustained.

9.5 The task of resource mobilisation for the public sector in the Seventh Plan is one of the most important challenges before the economy. The Sixth Plan saw massive mobilisation of resources for public sector Plan expenditure, especially on the part of the Central Government. Large increases in Plan expenditure were necessary because the Sixth Plan required heavy investments in highly capital intensive infrastructure sectors such as coal, power, railways, oil and fertilisers. Many of these sectors had suffered from inadequate investment in earlier years and large expenditures were needed to make up for earlier underinvestments. Central sector Plan expenditure was stepped up by 25 per cent per year on average for four years in succession.

9.6 Financing these increases required massive efforts at resource mobilisation and, in many respects, the economic situation was propitious for resource mobilisation. Large resources could be mobilised in the petroleum sector through a price adjustment which was desirable in any case, not only to finance the heavy expenditure needed for oil exploration but also in the interest of national energy use. The Government was also able to mop up a large volume of resources through tax and non-tax measures such as appropriate adjustments in tax rates and in interest rates and strengthened fiscal incentives for savings. The external resource position was also relatively flexible. Although concessional aid slowed down in terms of commitments during the Sixth Plan period, disbursements from the pipeline of committed assistance continued to grow. There was also room for new commercial borrowing and borrowing from the IMF, as the proportion of debt service payments to exports and current foreign exchange earnings was below the accepted norms providing room for additional borrowing.

9.7 It would be unrealistic to expect that all these factors will operate in the same way in the years ahead. In future, the scope for further increase in the areas of interest rates and tax rates is likely to be limited. There is undoubtedly scope for mobilising additional resources through improved tax administration and widening the base of taxation and these avenues must be fully explored. The attempt to bring tax evaders to book and to tap the taxable capacity of those who have benefited more than others from development such as large farmers and recipients of high incomes in the unorganised sector or the parallel economy must be intensified. It has to be recognised, however, that direct taxation cannot be relied upon to generate large revenues in a developing country with low average levels of income without affecting the incentives to save and invest. Indirect taxation has already reached high levels and the scope for raising additional resources through this instrument beyond the normal growth in revenues associated with rising production is limited. There is also little room for further price adjustments in key sectors without adversely affecting the inflationary situation as administered prices in several areas have already been increased rather sharply to cover increases in costs.

9.8 With the present rate of GDP growth and high savings ratio, further increases in the savings rate are likely to be increasingly difficult. The external resources position is also more constrained. The flow of funds from the IDA is going to be smaller than in the past, and the commercial debt that has already been incurred will limit the scope for further borrowing on hard terms if the debt service ratio is to remain within manageable bounds. The availability of resources in future would, therefore, depend to a great extent on the growth of public sector surpluses which must come primarily from improvements in operating efficiency and productivity. Efforts to overcome the resource constraints through excessive reliance upon either indirect taxes, price increases or deficit financing will only lead to inflation and erode real resources reducing the Plan size in real terms, apart from creating inequities and distortions in the economy.

9.9 The resource constraint underscores the importance of efficient use of available resources. The Seventh Plan must give high priority to quick maturing, high productivity investments especially in areas which are not capital intensive. An important feature of the economy today is that large capacities have been created in many areas which are not being fully utilised. Substantial increases in production are possible from existing capacity through relatively small investments in modernisation and upgradation of existing plants. In many areas small projects which do not tie up very large volumes of resources may be both more efficient and more suited to local level planning and implementation capacity. These opportunities must be fully exploited in the Seventh Plan period if we are to make maximum use of available resources. More generally the degree of discipline in Plan formulation and implementation

needs to be greatly improved. This can help to avoid cost over runs and delays in implementation both of which are a waste of national resources.

9.10 Efforts to increase productivity in agriculture must continue to have high priority in order so as to raise the rate of growth of agriculture above the levels already achieved. The recent performance in foodgrains is commendable but the underlying long term growth rate in foodgrains production still falls short of the level required to achieve sustained annual GDP growth at about 5 per cent. The rate of growth of agriculture in the Seventh Plan period will have to be higher than in the Sixth Plan period, if the country has to provide adequate quantities of foodgrains for an expanding population. Faster growth of agricultural production is required also for generating the necessary surplus for supporting a larger work force in manufacturing, supplying vital inputs, and also to provide a growing base of demand for sustaining faster growth in industrial output. Faster agricultural growth, combined with policies to ensure that the weaker sections participate fully in the growth process through acceleration of special programmes like the National Rural Employment Programme (NREP) and the Integrated Rural Development Programme (IRDP) is the key to raising the standard of living of the vast majority of the population.

9.11 The tasks before the country in agriculture are well identified. While there has been progress in expanding the area under irrigation, and also in providing modern inputs such as high yielding varieties of seeds, chemical fertilisers and pesticides, the increase in inputs does not appear to have produced a corresponding growth in yields per hectare for crops other than wheat. There is a large potential for achieving higher productivity in paddy cultivation. This is a crop in which high yields have already been obtained in some parts of the country under appropriate conditions of supply of inputs and water management. Raising productivity of area under paddy is, therefore, feasible and should receive the highest priority. Particular attention must be given to the eastern region and to parts of the southern region, where the rate of growth of paddy production in recent years has been unacceptably low. An area specific production programme with operational strategies suited for these areas is now necessary. This will not only help achieve higher agricultural production by extending the yield increases already obtained in some parts of the country, over a much larger area, it will also spread the benefits of the green revolution to areas that have not as yet benefited sufficiently, thus helping to promote equity and reduce inter-regional disparities which are important objectives of our development strategy. A similar area and crop specific effort needs to be mounted in oilseeds and pulses, where substantial production gains are possible through concerted efforts. Unlike in the case of paddy, the technology for achieving higher yields in these crops is not yet fully proven, but this only means that

special efforts will need to be made in the field of research also. In the long run, the country has to develop technologies for dry-land farming since the area under irrigation can at most extend to 40 per cent of the total area by the end of the century.

9.12 In industry the country needs to break out of the recent pattern, with industrial growth fluctuating around 5 per cent. Industry must grow at 7 to 8 per cent per year if the country has to achieve reasonable rates of GDP growth and provide employment to the growing labour force in urban areas and enlarge employment opportunities for the vast number of the underemployed rural labour. To a large extent, acceleration in industry itself depends upon an acceleration in agriculture, which apart from necessary input support would provide substantial expansionary stimulus to industry. Demand constraints are, however, not the only factor depressing industrial growth. Infrastructure constraints, particularly uncertainty and fluctuations in the availability of power, have also handicapped industry. There are also structural deficiencies in Indian industry which have created a high cost and low productivity industrial system lacking the innate dynamism needed for speedy growth. The absence of competitive pressure permits industrial units to survive with little incentive to reduce costs, modernise, or to upgrade technology, all of which are the essence of rapid growth. The industrial structure also has not adequately encouraged setting up of plants at optimum levels of capacity. The problems have been further compounded by the inability to close down irreparably inefficient units.

9.13 Industrial policy in recent years has attempted to overcome some of these problems by giving incentives for production, efficiency, and full utilisation of capacity. Efforts have also been made to promote modernisation and achieve technological upgradation of Indian industry. Progress, however, is slow. These efforts must continue and be expanded. Equally important, the efficiency of the public sector must be very substantially improved. The public sector has a vital role to play in our industrial structure, and low productivity and slow growth in production in public sector enterprises contributes to sluggishness in industry. The successful implementation of the accelerated programme for oil production and high growth rates of production achieved by a number of public sector undertakings have demonstrated the inherent strength and the potential of the public sector. This needs to be exploited fully through better management techniques and greater stress on productivity and profitability.

9.14 The balance of payments position is comfortable at present and it is a matter of satisfaction that we have been able to terminate the arrangement with the IMF on our own initiative. Much of the improvement witnessed in the past two years is because of the remarkable success in import saving in the petroleum sector resulting from rapid increases in domestic production combined with a softening of

oil prices in the past year. Because of this massive import saving, non-oil imports could grow in line with the needs of the economy while keeping total import growth at relatively low levels. We cannot count on these factors continuing to operate in our favour in the future. On the basis of present proven reserves, growth in oil production in the Seventh Plan period is likely to be slower. With a higher rate of growth of industrial production the demand for industrial imports should pick up. This is especially so if large investments involving modernisation and technological upgradation are to be undertaken, all of which require substantial imports of capital goods and components. In view of relatively slow growth of production of oilseeds, the need to import substantial amounts of edible oils is likely to continue.

9.15 The prospects for concessional assistance are extremely unfavourable, and many of our traditional sources such as the IDA will provide lower volumes in real terms than in the past. India has been able to avoid debt problems of the type witnessed in several other developing countries because of prudent management of the foreign exchange situation. It is ironic that a campaign is now being mounted in some quarters to the effect that India should now borrow on commercial terms and its access to concessional flows should be reduced. It is not appreciated that given the gigantic task of development faced by India, reliance on commercial loans for financing investments in infrastructure, agriculture, rural development, education, and other similar activities can be self-defeating. India is likely to face a current account deficit for a long time to come and financing of this deficit through commercial terms cannot be sustained for very long. Development projects in sectors mentioned above do not yield commercial rates of return, and denial of access to concessional loans can only mean a lower rate of investment in the economy in the long run. Commercial borrowings and IMF financing used in the Sixth Plan have already added to the debt service profile of the country and it would be unwise to stretch it much further.

9.16 Since the scope for additional financing in the Seventh Plan is limited, the effort must be to bring the current account deficit within the limits of available finance. This will be a major challenge in the Seventh Plan period calling for action on several fronts. An improved export performance will be critical in the years ahead. Higher exports will not only directly reduce the current account deficit, they will also help to improve the debt service ratio thus increasing our ability to absorb external financing. To some extent our success in promoting exports will depend upon the external environment. In this context the persistence of protectionist trends in the world economy is undoubtedly a serious constraint. However, this is not the only factor limiting our export performance. In spite of wide ranging incentives given to exporters, export performance has lagged behind targets. Priority attention will have to

be given in the Seventh Plan to identifying the constraints on exports which have prevented full utilisation of our export potential, and to overcoming them. We need a well thought out export strategy based on the development of competitive, high quality production in areas where we can compete internationally. This is not a matter of incentives alone. A dynamic export performance, ultimately requires a dynamic industrial sector, and it is only when Indian industry begins to show improved efficiency, cost consciousness and technology upgradation on a broad front that India's export performance will improve sufficiently. On the import front it will be necessary to intensify efforts at efficient import substitution, saving on imports where possible, while allowing adequate access to imports to achieve the objectives of raising productivity and modernising Indian industry. Better utilisation of existing and prospective capacity in steel and fertilisers provides major areas for future import savings. Equally important is the potential for import savings in edible oils. There is also scope for saving imports by restructuring investment away from sectors which are heavily import intensive. However, it is important to emphasise that our anxiety to save

imports must not result in intensifying the system of quantitative and administrative controls on vital imported inputs into production and investment. Our past experience shows that detailed administrative import controls in these areas increase delays, save very little imports in actual practice, and result in a high cost industrial structure. A more effective way of saving foreign exchange is to reduce the growth of consumption in areas where we are dependent on imports and increase domestic production along efficient lines.

9.17 Despite strains, the last four years have been years of significant economic progress. In future, the key to growth at a higher rate with stability in prices as well as in the balance of payments position will lie in the growth of agriculture. Equally important is the need for the public sector to improve profitability and step up the level of investment particularly in areas like irrigation and power. Given a faster increase in agricultural production and the foundations already laid, it is well within our capacity to achieve steady growth at a high level with an equitable distribution of benefits.
