

SOCIAL SECTORS

Human development is the ultimate goal of our development programmes and is also crucial for the long run success of economic reforms. Sound, long-term development of social sectors, such as education and health, is crucial for sustaining higher rates of overall economic growth in an increasingly integrated world economy. Significant progress has been made over the years in human resource development which is reflected in improved demographic indicators, literacy and educational levels, health care services and other social overhead facilities. However, considerable ground remains to be covered in view of the continuing heavy demographic pressure, regional and class disparities in access to social infrastructure, and our still low levels of attainment in social sectors compared to even several developing countries in Asia. It is, therefore, necessary to pursue a conscious policy to strengthen development in social sectors and to protect the interests of the poor and vulnerable sections of society during the period of transition to a path of sustainable, broad-based growth.

2 The Government recognises the need to minimise the short-term social costs which may arise in the process of reform and adjustment. Allocations for social sectors were significantly stepped up in 1993-94 following the manoeuvrability gained through overall fiscal correction (Table 9.1). The ongoing programmes of poverty alleviation and employment generation and other social sector programmes are being strengthened and re-oriented in favour of the poor and more deserving groups. The public distribution system has been revamped in 1752 blocks in remote and backward areas to support the essential consumption of the poor. The National Renewal Fund, established in 1991-92, is supplementing the existing Social Safety Net by financing schemes of compensation, retraining and re-deployment of workers affected by economic restructuring.

3 The Eighth Five Year Plan also enjoins that the provision of basic elements which help development of human capital, viz., employment generation, population control, literacy, education, health, drinking water supply, and provision of food and basic infrastructure, remain the primary responsibility of the Government. The April and September 1993 meetings of the National Development Council (NDC) brought out gaps in our performance in some of the most important areas of human development and outlined additional measures for promotion of family welfare, literacy and employment.

4 There has, indeed, been significant progress in human development in the country as reflected in its broad indicators (Table 9.2). Since 1950-51, a very significant improvement in educational attainments, health coverage and in

the provision of basic social infrastructure has come about. Considering the dimensions and complexities of the problems and overall constraints of resources, these are not insignificant achievements.

5 However, considerable ground remains to be covered in the face of continuing heavy demographic pressure. This fact also gets highlighted by international comparisons. India ranked 134 among 173 countries in 1993 in terms of the Human Development Index (HDI) of the UNDP, which takes into account Purchasing Power Parity (PPP) Adjusted real per capita GDP, Life expectancy at birth and Educational Attainment (Adult Literacy Rate and Mean Years of Schooling). Most of the Asian countries ranked above India. Notwithstanding any conceptual and methodological issues in the construction of HDI, this cannot be regarded a satisfactory position.

6 The level of public expenditure on social sectors in India does not compare altogether unfavourably with that in other Asian countries. This would be evident from Table 9.3.

7 However, considering our inadequate levels of social and economic development, high incidence of poverty and regional disparities, a much higher order of social sector spending is warranted. For this to be sustainable, less productive expenditure has to be curbed both at the level of the Centre and the States. Furthermore, imbalances in social sector spending need to be rectified. For example, in education, a higher proportion of public spending needs to be channelled for primary education, along with substantial cost-recovery on higher and technical education.

Similarly, within the health sector, a greater proportion of resources needs to be allocated to primary and preventive health facilities. Further, the focus of social sector spending in rural areas and on vulnerable groups including women and children needs to be sharpened.

8 Following the emphasis on human resource development, the Eighth Plan outlay on social sectors and rural development has been increased by about 180 per cent over that in the Seventh Plan. In consonance with the same policy, considerable step up in the allocations for these sectors was made in the Central Government's budget for 1993-94.

Poverty

9 Alleviation of poverty and unemployment continue to be the long run objectives of economic and social development in our country. The Planning Commission has been preparing estimates of the proportion and number of poor in the country. Such estimates were prepared for 1972-73, 1977-78, 1983-84 and 1987-88. These were based on the concept of the poverty line and data on household expenditure obtained through National Sample Survey Rounds. Following the recommendations of the Task Force on Projection of Minimum Needs and Effective Consumption Demand (1979), the Poverty Line was defined as the per capita monthly expenditure needed to obtain the consumption basket corresponding to the calorie norms of 2400 per capita per day in rural areas and 2100 per capita per day in urban areas in the base year 1973-74. The poverty line so defined was Rs.49.10 for rural areas and Rs.56.60 for urban areas. The same poverty line was updated for subsequent years using suitable indicators of change in cost of living.

10 The estimates of poverty at the national level for the years 1972-73, 1977-78, 1983-84 and 1987-88 are given below:

These estimates show a continuous decline in the poverty proportions.

11 In view of the methodological issues raised in respect of the estimates on poverty and also poverty alleviation being an objective of economic and social development, the Planning Commission constituted an Expert Group in September 1989 to consider methodology and computational aspects of estimation of proportion and number of poor in the country. The Expert Group, while retaining the concept of poverty line as recommended by the Task Force, suggested changes in the price deflator to update the poverty line for use in later years. It suggested use of State specific price indices which can reflect the changes in cost of consumption basket of the people around the poverty line. It relied exclusively on the National Sample Survey (NSS) data on consumption expenditure to assess the incidence of poverty without adjusting the NSS Consumption to that obtained from macro-aggregates of the national accounts.

12 The estimates of percentage of population living below the poverty line arrived at by the Expert Group are as under:

The report of the Expert Group which was submitted in July 1993 was released by the Planning Commission, and its recommendations are under consideration. The Expert Group estimates also confirm a steady decline in the pro-

portion of population living below the poverty line. Yet, a substantially high proportion of people continue to be living below the poverty line. This underscores the need for rapid growth of output and employment coupled with strengthening of the special programmes of poverty alleviation and employment generation. The problem of poverty has to be dealt in the framework of the strategy of development laying emphasis on those sectors whose growth makes a significant impact on the income levels of the underemployed.

Population and Family Welfare

13 High growth rate of population has been a major problem facing the country. The 1991 Census places the population at 846.3 million as against 683.3 million in 1981, i.e., a growth of 23.9 per cent over the decade. The annual exponential growth rate works out to 2.14 per cent during the decade 1981-91 which is marginally lower than 2.22 per cent during 1971-81.

14 The containment of population growth has been accorded priority in the Eighth Plan. It aims at reducing the crude birth rate from 30.2 per thousand in 1990 (provisionally estimated at 29.0 per thousand in 1992) to 26 per thousand by 1997. The infant mortality rate is also to be brought down from 80 per thousand live births in 1990 (provisionally estimated at 79 in 1992) to 70 over the same period. The target of achieving a Net Reproduction Rate (NRR) of unity by the turn of the century, included in the Population Policy of 1983 and the Seventh Five Year Plan, has been shifted to the period 2011-2016 A.D. as per the Eighth Plan. Policy interventions must eventually develop into a popular mass movement for containing population growth. This would also require due attention being paid to increasing female literacy, raising age at marriage of girls, creating employment opportunities for women and raising their status in society. The recommendations of the NDC Committee on Population, whose report was presented to NDC in April 1993, are relevant in this connection (Box 9.1). In its meeting on 18th September, the NDC endorsed the report of the Committee and directed the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare to initiate further action.

15 Family welfare and health care measures have shown positive results in reducing both birth and death rates (Table 9.2), but population growth remains a critical problem as the decline in birth rate has not been sufficient to significantly reduce the population growth rate. It is, however, significant that the fertility rate (i.e., number of live births per thousand women in the reproductive age group of 15 to 45 years) came down from 5.2 in 1971 to 3.6 in 1991. The infant mortality rate came down to 79 per thousand live births in 1992 from 95 in 1987. Couple protection rate

BOX - 9.1
NDC Committee on Population — Major Recommendations

- The outreach and quality of family welfare programme be improved by removing the backlog and strengthening of health care infrastructure [Sub-centres, Primary Health Centres (PHCs) and Community Health Centres (CHCs)] and improving availability of drugs and other supplies.
- Medical Termination of Pregnancy/sterilisation facilities be created at each CHC/PHC and sub-divisional hospital. All district/sub-divisional hospitals to have Post-Partum units.
- Strengthening of pre-service and in-service training of family welfare staff by involving national and regional institutions.
- Integrated inter-sectoral coordination at grass-root (village) level by involving Panchayats, women and youth organisations to carry out family welfare programme as part of overall development programme. It should be made a people's movement.
- Review and strengthening of Village Health Guides (VHGs) and Traditional Birth Attendants (TBAs) to usefully involve them in family welfare programme.
- Differential approaches and area-specific strategies to family welfare may be adopted.
- Allowing requisite flexibility in programme planning and implementation in view of area-specific socio-economic and demographic differentials. Concentrating on micro-planning, in the first instance, in 90 districts with birth-rates over 39 per thousand. Development of district level Health Management Information System.
- Evolving new and innovative approaches in Information, Education and Communication (IEC) and establishment of their validity for local suitability.
- Strengthening mechanisms for monitoring, evaluation, research support and securing commitment and support of leadership.
- Attention to social determinants, such as, age at marriage of girls; literacy; health status and employment of women, etc.
- Gradually increasing allocation for family welfare programme to about 3 per cent of total public sector plan outlay.
- Formulation of a National Population Policy to take a long-term holistic view of various aspects and for effective implementation of strategies.

reached 43 per cent in 1993 from a mere 12.2 per cent in 1972. The performance of family planning programme varies significantly amongst States, with the more populous northern States considerably lagging behind. The Department of Family Welfare has identified 90 poor performing districts (83 of them in Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh) to provide special inputs. The scheme, with a total outlay of Rs.320 crore, would utilise the entire World Bank assistance under the Social Safety Net Programme for family welfare during 1992-94 in these districts. Other important initiatives include a seven-year Child Survival and Safe Motherhood (CSSM) Programme launched in 51 districts in 1992-93 and extended to another 103 districts in 1993-94; constitution of Mahila Swasthya Sanghs (MSSs) to involve active women of the community and village level women functionaries, sale of Nirodh through the Public Distribution System introduced in 10 States and provision of additional inputs through Area Projects in 15 States and Delhi for reducing maternal and child mortality, morbidity and birth rate. Steps are also being taken to involve and intensify participation of NGOs and private sector in the family welfare programme. An Expert Committee

under the Chairmanship of Dr.M.S.Swaminathan is in the process of drafting a National Population Policy.

Literacy and Education

16 The significance of education as a major determinant of socio-economic development is well established. Empirical evidence in the Indian context has shown a high negative correlation between female literacy, on the one hand, and fertility and infant and maternal mortality, on the other. UNESCO studies have also brought out that a stabilised adult literacy level of 70 per cent is a positive indication of universal primary education and a critical threshold for economic growth.

17 The country has made considerable progress in the sphere of education over the past four decades. The Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER) in the Primary Stage (Class I-V) increased from 42.6 per cent in 1950-51 to 105.7 per cent in 1992-93 and in the Upper Primary Stage (class VI-VIII) from 12.7 per cent to 67.5 per cent. The proportion of children moving up from the Primary to Upper Primary Stage has also increased steadily - from 16.3 per cent in 1950-51 to

about 34 per cent in 1991-92. Substantial progress in literacy levels and in the spread of educational institutions has been attained (Tables 9.6 and 9.7) In technical education, about 230 recognised institutions at the first degree level and more than 600 polytechnics at the diploma level have annual admission capacity of 45,000 and 88,000 students, respectively. Besides, about 150 institutions offer post-graduate and specialised research facilities with an annual capacity of 10,000 students.

18 According to the 1991 census, the literacy rate in the country (in the age-group 7 years and above) was 52.2 per cent. There are, however, vast inter-state variations in educational attainments. The literacy rate among females is only 39.3 per cent (as against 64.1 per cent for males); it is only 44.2 per cent in rural areas (compared to 73.1 per cent in the urban areas) and it is significantly lower for the Scheduled Castes (37.4 per cent) and the Scheduled Tribes (29.6 per cent) population.

19 Universalisation of elementary education and eradi-

cation of illiteracy in the age-group 15-35 years are basic objectives of education in the Eighth Plan. About 19 to 24 million children in the age-group 6-14 and over 121 million adult illiterates in the age-group 15-35 (with over 60 per cent females in both cases) are estimated to constitute the target group in this context. The strategies adopted include a phased reduction in the ratio between primary and middle schools from the existing 4:1 to 2:1, adoption of a decentralised approach to curriculum development, quality improvement in the process of teaching and learning, emphasis on child-centred and activity-based approach and reduction of curricular load.

20 Spread of education faces complex socio-economic, administrative and financial problems. It is realised that along with investment and provision of infrastructure, a holistic planning and management approach, covering aspects of access, specially for girls and disadvantaged groups; non-formal education; increasing learning competence of children; raising teachers' abilities; and convergence of education, health, welfare and related services at micro-level, are required. The NDC Committee on Literacy, which gave its report in 1993, has also, among other things, emphasised these aspects (Box 9.2). The report of the Committee was generally endorsed by the NDC in its meeting in September 1993 and it was resolved that a meeting of the Chief Ministers will be convened for discussion and working out an action plan for effective implementation of the report.

21 Eradication of illiteracy, along with bringing about qualitative improvements in education, is a gigantic task in our country, the network for elementary education being one of the largest in the world. The investment requirements are commensurately high and mobilisation of funds from various sources becomes a critical consideration. The recommendation of the Education Commission (1964-66)

BOX 9.2**NDC Committee on Literacy—Major Recommendations**

- To improve structural aspects of Elementary Education :
 - Operation Blackboard scheme should be made more flexible.
 - Arrangements for text-books must satisfy the triple criteria of quality, low price and timely availability. They may be supplied free of cost at primary level.
 - A child-to-child approach may be adopted to stabilise children in school system.
 - Teacher Development Centres (TDCs) may be promoted.
 - Voluntary agencies/NGOs may be encouraged to open primary schools in geographically difficult areas and among disadvantaged groups.
 - Statewise strategies may be developed for some form of compulsory schooling for the elementary age-group.
 - In opening primary/upper primary schools, top priority may be given to unserved habitations and areas with concentration of minority groups, SC/ST population and backward classes.
 - Recruitment of women teachers to primary schools should be the general policy and by 2000 A.D. their number should range from 60 to 80 per cent.
- To improve pedagogical aspects of Elementary Education :
 - Along with a national 'core' curriculum, differential curricula suiting local environment, may be evolved. They may be linked to secondary education and work situations.
 - Non-formal education be conducted through 'Learning Clubs'.
 - A National Evaluation Organisation be set up to re-orient the system of evaluation to make it more purposive and productive.
- In respect of the structural aspects of adult education :
 - The linkage between national, state and district level structures concerned with adult education should be strengthened. Role of the Directorate of Adult Education may be redefined to work as Secretariat of the National Literacy Mission and with the primary function to monitor Total Literacy Campaigns (TLCs).
 - The National Institute of Adult Education (NIAE) should be entrusted with all functions relating to literacy materials, training, etc. requiring research and high level of expertise.
 - Purposeful networking of government and non-government institutions at grass-root level should be effected.
 - States and UTs should formulate district action plans to eradicate illiteracy latest by 2000 A.D.
- Panchayati Raj institutions be strengthened. Village Education Committees may be suitably empowered.
- Outlay for Elementary Education and Adult Education in the successive Annual Plans should not be less than 50 per cent of Education sector outlay.
- Central and State Governments should consider levying an "education cess" on urban and rural revenues/incomes/properties.

that public expenditure on education should be at least 6 per cent of the GNP has been reiterated time and again by committees and experts and also by the Prime Minister, at the Education for All (EFA) Summit (New Delhi, December 1993). Over the years, the percentage of GNP spent on education has increased significantly - from about 1.2 per cent in 1950-51 to well over 3 per cent now.

22 Table 9.8 brings out that over three-fourths of the funds of the educational institutions flow from government. Further, the share of fee and endowments and other resources of these institutions have sharply declined. Given the resource constraints of the Union and the State Governments, there is a need for raising internal resources within the sector by suitably revising fee and other user charges and mobilising non-governmental resources. Reprioritisation of expenditure within the education sector in favour of elementary education is essential both in view of its needs and high returns on such expenditure. The share of elementary education in intra-sectoral spending at less than 40 per cent is quite low and also compares unfavourably with many Asian countries. The heavy subsidisation of high-cost higher and technical education has to be reduced as the entire education sector is badly in need of finances and even maintenance of already created capacity and education infrastructure has become difficult. These aspects are now receiving increasing attention. As regards overall expenditure, 1993-94 saw a substantial raise in the budget allocations for the Central Plan programmes for education - from Rs. 952 crore in 1992-93 to Rs. 1310 crore, i.e., a step up of 37.6 per cent. As education is a subject in the Concurrent List of the Constitution and much of the maintenance expenditure is borne by the State

governments, fiscal adjustment at the state level is highly desirable to enable them to undertake necessary responsibilities in this sector.

Medical and Health Care

23 India is a signatory to the Alma Ata Declaration of 1978 and has set for itself the goal of Health for All (HFA) by 2000 A.D. through emphasis on primary health care. Accordingly, the National Health Policy was adopted by Parliament in 1983. Within the HFA strategy, health for the under-privileged is to be promoted consciously and consistently through community-based systems.

24 Over the years, there has been considerable expansion of infrastructure for health services (Table 9.9). A three-tier system comprising Community Health Centres (CHC), Primary Health Centres (PHC) and Sub-centres, has been established. The targets of one Sub-centre for a population of 5000 and one PHC for a population of 30,000 in general and one Sub-centre for a population of 3000 and one PHC for a population of 20,000 in hilly and tribal areas, have already been achieved.

25 Between 1951 and 1992, life expectancy at birth increased from 32.1 years to 60.3 years, birth-rate came down from 39.9 to 29 per thousand, death rate fell from 27.4 per thousand to about 10 per thousand and infant mortality declined from 139 per 1000 live births in 1972 to 79 in 1992. Small-pox has been eradicated and plague is no longer a problem. Morbidity due to malaria, cholera, etc. has very considerably declined. But much progress is still to be made to bring health standards and medical facilities in the country at par with even many of the developing coun-

tries. Considerable rural-urban and inter-state disparities are also observed in the achievements in this sector. Inspite of special efforts and perceptible progress made, the incidence of diseases like tuberculosis, malaria, leprosy and kala-azar continues to be significant. The biases in favour of curative vis-a-vis preventive, and of secondary and tertiary health-care facilities rather than primary, need to be corrected. An all-round improvement in services and delivery systems is also desirable.

26 Provision of primary health care facilities is one of the basic objectives of the Eighth Plan. The HFA paradigm focuses on the high risk vulnerable groups, namely, mothers and children and the under-privileged sections of society. In rural areas, the emphasis is on consolidation and operationalisation of the existing network of health centres and strengthening of physical facilities and equipment, to bring about a qualitative improvement in the delivery of services. Along with, upgradation of urban health services, strengthening of secondary health care services and optimisation of tertiary health care services, constitute major elements of the plan strategy.

27 A further thrust is being given to disease control. Important developments in this respect include : (i) An allocation of Rs. 189 crore from the National Renewal Fund for Disease Control Programme, nutrition and primary health infrastructure. (ii) In view of high-intensity of malaria transmission in tribal areas of seven states (viz, Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Orissa, Gujarat, Maharashtra and Rajasthan), they would be provided 100 per cent central assistance for malaria control, in tribal areas. (iii) The Multi-Drug Therapy (MDT) services to control leprosy are being contemplated to cover entire country during the Eighth Plan. (iv) The National T.B. Control Programme is being revamped in view of the continuing high incidence of T.B. and its likely escalation with the spread of Human Immuno Deficiency Virus (HIV) infections. District T.B. Centres have been equipped with short course chemotherapy drug regimes which would reduce the treatment period from 18-24 months to 6-8 months. (v) A massive Rs. 222.6 crore programme to prevent and control Acquired Immuno Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) has been launched. (vi) To control preventable blindness, which is estimated to affect about 12 million persons in the country, a World Bank Project has been proposed in seven large States with an outlay of Rs. 554 crore, in addition to the National Programme for control of blindness.

28 Given the resource constraints of the Centre and the States, efforts should be made to augment the health finances by introducing appropriate user charges in the case of curative and referral urban health facilities. Reprioritisation of health outlay in favour of primary, preventive and rural health services and their cost effective delivery, is also necessary.

Social Security and Welfare

29 Social security has been listed in the Concurrent List of the Constitution signifying the responsibility of both the Centre and the States in this sphere. The task of providing meaningful social security continues to be challenging in view of financial as well as operational constraints, high incidence of poverty, unemployment, illiteracy and the large size of unorganised/informal sector.

30 The permanent social security benefits provided through legislative measures like Workmen's Compensation Act, Employees State Insurance Act, Employees Provident Fund & Miscellaneous Provisions Act, Maternity Benefit Act, and Payment of Gratuity Act, etc. cater to mainly organised urban labour comprising less than 10 per cent of the total labour force. Most of the States/UTs have pension schemes for the old and disabled, but due to eligibility criteria of income and age, only about 9 per cent of old-age population gets the benefit of pension. In the last few years, group insurance schemes for landless agricultural labourers, life insurance scheme for Integrated Rural Development Programme (IRDP) beneficiaries and group insurance for certain categories of workers belonging to weaker sections of the society have been introduced. The coverage under permanent social security measures, however, continues to be small.

31 Emphasis is, therefore, being given to transitory measures of social security. These include special employment and anti-poverty programmes, welfare programmes for development of women, children, weaker sections of the society, handicapped and disabled persons, Public Distribution System for supply of essential commodities at low prices, and subsidised education and basic health care. In addition, in order to mitigate the possible adverse impact of economic reforms, the National Renewal Fund has been established to fund schemes for compensation, retraining and redeployment of workers affected by restructuring.

32 Women and children deserve special and supplementary support in general development programmes. The Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) programme seeks to ensure for children in the age group 0-6 years and the expectant and nursing mothers, a package of services comprising health check-ups, immunization, referral services, supplementary feeding, nutrition and health, and pre-school education for children and nutrition education for mothers. The programme, which had made a modest beginning in 1975 with 33 experimental ICDS projects, now comprises 3066 projects covering 16.3 million children and 3.2 million mothers all over the country. Besides the ICDS, programmes like Early Childhood Education (ECE) and Balwadi Nutrition Programme (BNP) are contributing to children's development. They have also been accorded priority in National Nutrition Policy (1993). In 507 ICDS

blocks, the programme infrastructure is being used to provide services to adolescent girls, including nutrition and health care, functional literacy and vocational training.

33 To make women economically independent and self-reliant, priority is being accorded to them in employment and income generation programmes. Under the Integrated Rural Development Programme (IRDP) and Jawahar Rozgar Yojana (JRY), 40 per cent and 30 per cent coverage, respectively, are earmarked for women. A number of schemes to support and facilitate women-employment are also in vogue, viz., Hostels for Working Women, Daycare Centres and Creches, Employment-cum-training-cum Production Centres, etc.

34 In recent years, some special initiatives have been taken for development and welfare of women. The National Commission for Women set up in 1992, has a comprehensive mandate to study and monitor matters relating to constitutional and legal safeguards for women, review existing legislations concerning them and look into complaints involving deprivation of their rights. The Rashtriya Mahila Kosh seeks to develop a network of credit services for women in informal sector and to support self-employment ventures; it seeks to cover 2 lakh women in first six years. The Mahila Samridhi Yojana (MSY) launched on October 2, 1993, aims at promoting amongst the rural women the habit to save and improve their financial assets. Gender sensitisation and awareness schemes are being launched for improving the social environment for women.

35 For the development and welfare of weaker sections of the society like Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, backward classes and physically handicapped and disabled persons, various schemes are in operation. The Special Component Plan for Scheduled Castes is in operation in 21 States and 3 Union Territories. There are 21 State Scheduled Caste Development Corporations to assist entrepreneurs to procure loans for taking up bankable projects. Fifty per cent of the families to be assisted under IRDP and 30 per cent of employment generation under JRY are reserved for SC/STs. Against this, the actual coverage was over 51 per cent under IRDP and over 56 per cent under JRY. In addition, under Indira Awaas Yojana and Million Wells Scheme of JRY, houses are constructed free of cost and free boring of wells is done for persons belonging to SC/ST and freed bonded labourers. For the development and welfare of Scheduled Tribes, Tribal Sub-Plans are in operation since 1975 and 193 Integrated Tribal Development Projects are functioning in 18 States and 2 Union Territories. Tribal Cooperative Marketing Development Federation facilitates marketing of tribal produce, especially minor forest produce. National Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes Finance and Development Corporation serves as a national institution to support the activi-

ties of State SC and ST Development Corporations. Since its inception in February, 1989 it has sanctioned over 480 income generating projects covering over 1.74 lakh SC and ST beneficiaries.

36 Some important initiatives taken recently to improve the well-being of the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes, as well as Other Backward Classes, include: (i) Reservation of 27 per cent of jobs for Other Backward Classes (OBCs) in the Central Government and Public Sector Undertakings, excluding the creamy layer. (ii) Setting up a National Commission for Backward Classes (iii) A scheme for educational complexes in low literacy pockets for improving literacy among tribal women. (iv) Setting up of a National Backward Classes Finance and Development Corporation with an authorised capital of Rs. 200 crore to promote economic and other development activities of the backward classes. (v) Raising of the share capital of the National Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes Finance Development Corporation from Rs. 75 crore to Rs. 125 crore.

Water Supply and Sanitation

37 Considerable progress has been made in the provision of safe drinking water to all, especially in underserved villages. But in view of the large magnitude of the problem, considerable ground remains to be covered. The Seventh Five Year Plan which targeted to provide all the 1,61,722 identified hard-core no-source problem villages with the facility of safe drinking water, left a backlog of 8,365 villages. During 1990-93, about 7615 villages from these were covered and out of the remaining 750 villages targeted for the current year, 78 were covered by October 1993.

38 Table 9.10 gives the coverage of population in rural and urban areas under safe drinking water supply and sanitation facilities. The coverage under water-supply has shown considerable progress since 1985, mainly due to efforts made during the International Drinking Water Supply and Sanitation Decade (1981-91). Under sanitation in

rural areas, 3.15 per cent coverage of population by March 1993 corresponds to Government assisted programmes only. However, according to the National Sample Survey (44th Round, July 1988-June 1989), 10.96 per cent of rural population had access to sanitation facilities, including coverage through private initiative.

39 In the Eighth Five Year Plan, besides completion of the remaining no-source hard-core villages by March 1994, augmentation of safe drinking water supply in 1.5 lakh partially covered villages is contemplated. In addition, coverage will be extended to new no-source habitations emerging due to drought or depletion of water table. Special attention is being paid to coverage of SC/ST population and other weaker sections under the programme. Priority is being given to improve the quality of water for eradicating water-borne diseases. Under sanitation, the Eighth Plan lays emphasis on Total Environmental Sanitation approach in rural areas, making Information, Education and Communication (IEC) an integral part of the programme, and on elimination of manual scavenging. The integrated scheme of Low Cost Sanitation and Liberation of Scavengers is in operation in 760 towns in 19 States. The Employment of Manual Scavengers and Construction of Dry Latrines (Prohibition), Bill, 1993 was passed by Parliament.

Housing

40 Due to large and fast growing population and urbanisation, the housing problem has assumed a serious magnitude. According to the estimates of National Buildings Organisation (NBO), the usable housing stock in 1991 was 92.8 million in rural areas and 36.7 million in urban areas. The total backlog of housing was estimated at 31 million in 1991 of which 10.4 million was in urban areas. The magnitude of the housing requirement during 1991-2001 is estimated to be 79 million dwelling units to meet fully the backlog and requirements of additions to population. It is estimated that about 48.8 million persons were living in slums in 1990. Provision of services, proper sanitation and availability of safe water within reasonable distance also continue to pose serious problems in many areas.

41 Housing is a priority sector in the Eighth Five Year Plan, both being a basic need and a labour-intensive activity offering well-dispersed employment opportunities. The strategy consists of creating an enabling environment, removing the constraints and providing direct assistance to the specially disadvantaged groups including rural and urban poor, SC/ST, physically handicapped, widows and single women. The Eighth Plan outlay for housing has been raised substantially to Rs.6377 crore as compared to Rs. 2424.34 crore in the Seventh Five Year Plan. This is to be supplemented by Rs.20,000 to Rs.25,000 crore of institutional finance during the Plan period. Planning Commis-

sion has set up a standing committee to monitor investment by the formal sector in housing.

42 Housing has also been dovetailed with other Central and Centrally Sponsored Schemes. Under Jawahar Rozgar Yojana, 6 per cent of the resources are earmarked for Indira Awaas Yojana (IAY). It aims at construction of dwelling units for the poorest belonging to SCs/STs and freed bonded labourers in rural areas. The scheme of Environmental Improvement of Urban Slums (EIUS) makes available basic amenities in the slums; the Urban Basic Services for the Poor (UBSP) seeks to integrate them in the State sector. Under Nehru Rozgar Yojana (NRY), the Scheme for Housing and Shelter Upgradation (SHASU) provides assistance to the urban poor in settlements having a population between one to twenty lakh, with a relaxation in the lower population limit of one lakh in certain specified areas.

43 The National Housing Bank (NHB), set up in July 1988, provides assistance through a number of schemes like Home Loan Account Scheme and refinance for direct housing loan given by scheduled banks and non-banking institutions. Till March 1993, refinance assistance provided by the NHB was Rs. 1515.08 crore for about one million new dwelling units. For land development and shelter projects by public and private agencies, it advanced Rs.132.01 crore till end of March 1993. From the incremental deposits in commercial banks, 1.5 per cent is channelled to the housing sector, out of which 30 per cent is earmarked as direct loans to individuals. The LIC and GIC loan allocations to States for 1993-94 were Rs.201.83 crore and Rs.57.83 crore, respectively.

44 The National Cooperative Housing Federation finances 23 State level apex cooperative bodies for providing refinance to Primary Cooperatives. It had provided over Rs. 2164 crore till March 1993 for construction of over 12.21 lakh housing units. The Housing and Urban Development Corporation caters to the financial needs of States and Local Housing Boards, Development Authorities, cooperatives, etc. About 55 per cent of its sanctions for housing projects are earmarked for the economically weaker sections of the society and low income groups and out of it, 15 per cent for rural areas. Up to October, 1993, it financed over 5.6 million units with loans aggregating Rs.7954 crore. Dissemination of low cost technology and alternate materials, including utilisation of industrial wastes, etc. is being done through the Central Scheme for Building Centres and through the Building Materials and Technology Promotion Council. A scheme to encourage NRI investment in housing and real estate development has been formulated and is with the State governments for drawing up and executing projects.

45 Major legislative initiatives to promote housing include formulation of Model Rent Control Legislation; Constitution Amendment Bill for establishment of State level Rent Tribunals passed by Parliament and sent to the States for ratification; Model Apartment Ownership Legislation circulated to States, and a Model Law for regulation of builders and developers. A comprehensive review of the Urban Land Ceilings Act is also in progress.

Labour and Employment

46 Unemployment is a major socio-economic problem which must be tackled on a priority basis. At the outset of the Eighth Five Year Plan (1992-97), employment was estimated to be 301.7 million. The open unemployment was estimated at 17 million, of which the educated accounted for 7 million. Severe underemployment was estimated as 6 million. The backlog of unemployment for planning purposes was thus reckoned at 23 million in April 1992. As the net additions to labour force during the Eighth Five Year Plan and during the period 1997-2002 were estimated at 35 million and 36 million, respectively, the task of reducing unemployment to negligible levels by 2002 implied that employment should grow at the average annual rate of about 2.6 to 2.8 per cent over the ten year period 1992-2002.

47 The Eighth Five Year Plan seeks to achieve 2.6 per cent rate of growth of employment corresponding to an average annual rate of growth of GDP of 5.6 per cent envisaged in the plan. This is sought to be achieved by laying emphasis on a crop-wise and geographic diversification of agricultural growth, wasteland development, promotion of agro-based activities, rural non-farm activities including rural industries, the decentralised and small scale sector of industry, the urban informal sector and the services sector, expansion of rural infrastructure, housing and health and educational services especially in rural areas, revamping of the training system and streamlining of the special employment programmes to integrate them with area development plans. Additional employment opportunities of the order of 8 to 9 million per year, on an average, during the Eighth Plan period and of the order of 9 to 10 million per year, on an average, during the period 1997-2002 are expected to be generated.

48 It is estimated that 6 million additional employment opportunities were generated during 1992-93, showing an improvement over 1991-92, when only 3 million additional employment opportunities are estimated to have been created. However, this fell short of the average annual number of additional employment opportunities envisaged in the Plan and also of the estimated average annual net addition to labour force. Open unemployment may thus have increased by about a million during 1992-93.

49 The number of applicants on the live register of em-

ployment exchanges at the end of November, 1993 was 362.52 lakh (provisional) as against 367.75 lakh at the end of November, 1992, i.e., a decrease of 1.4 per cent. The vacancies notified during April-November, 1993 were 2.66 lakh against 2.76 lakh during the same period in 1992. The placements effected during April-November, 1993 was 1.57 lakh as against 1.49 lakh during April-November, 1992. The educated job-seekers (Matriculation and above) constitute over 60 per cent of the registered. However, it may be conceded that employment exchange statistics do not provide a full coverage, on the one hand, and include a substantial proportion of persons who might be actually employed or having multiple and advance registrations, on the other.

50 In view of the importance of tackling the unemployment problem, a Committee of the NDC was appointed in early 1991 to suggest ways and means of achieving the goal of near-full employment in a ten year period. The Committee submitted its report in September, 1992. The NDC endorsed the recommendations of the Committee at its meeting held on the 18th September, 1993 and directed that the recommendations be implemented by the Central Ministries and State Governments and that this may be monitored by the Planning Commission (also see Box 9.3).

51 In order to achieve the employment goals of the Eighth Plan, over 9 million additional employment opportunities would have to be generated per year on an average during the period 1993-97. This is a stupendous task and underscores the significance of achieving a higher average annual growth rate of the economy than envisaged in the plan and vigorous pursuit of the employment strategies envisaged in different sectors in the Plan. While these are to be achieved in a medium-term setting, the efforts initiated to streamline the on-going special programmes of poverty alleviation and employment generation would usefully contribute to employment generation in the short run.

52 Prevalence of child labour, in spite of constitutional and legal deterrents, is a scourge on our society. Policies and programmes relating to child-survival and development have been accorded high priority in the Eighth Plan. It is recognised that successful implementation of programmes of poverty alleviation, reforms in existing social and economic structures, institutional changes and female education will, by raising the standards of living of the under-privileged sections of society, have a favourable impact on child survival and development. But specific programmes and services directed at children would also be necessary. The National Child Labour Policy formulated in 1987 envisaged, *inter alia*, a project-based plan of action aimed at rehabilitation of children withdrawn from employment through provision of welfare inputs, like non-formal education, vocational training, health care and sup-

BOX 9.3
NDC Committee on Employment — Major Recommendations

- Besides creation of additional productive employment opportunities, the strategy should focus on augmentation of existing employment in terms of productivity and incomes.
- The augmentation strategy is particularly useful in States where stimulation to agricultural growth, diversification of the economies and movement out of agriculture is needed. In States with higher agricultural productivity and more open unemployment, strategies favouring faster expansion of secondary and tertiary activities would be desirable. More specific strategies are called for in areas with special problems.
- In the realm of sectoral strategies, thrust areas should be diversification of agriculture, irrigation, stimulation to rural non-agricultural employment, small scale industries and cottage industries, large scale programmes of construction, faster growth of the services and the informal sector.
- Vast regional variations in work requirements and structure, needs of women, marginal farmers and labourers, etc. re-emphasise micro-planning.
- A three-pronged strategy for educated employment is needed comprising development of employment - intensive sectors; promotion of self-employment; and raising responsiveness of education and training to labour-market.
- A national wage policy may be evolved for removing irrational and inequitable disparities in wages and salary levels and to induce efficiency, and for bringing unorganised sector within its purview.
- Increased access of educated women to employment and training, creation of special cells/branches in banks to meet their credit needs and fixing for them a minimum coverage in self-employment.
- A major restructuring of on-going special programmes is needed. Significant part of rural development outlay may be utilised for building rural infrastructure. Redesigned and expanded programme of Integrated Development of Small & Medium Towns for generating wage employment in smaller towns may be taken up.

plementary nutrition. Nine National Child Labour Projects have been set up in areas of concentration of child labour. Special schools form a major component of the project through which welfare inputs are provided to such children; 124 schools covering 6900 children have been set up. Ten States/UTs and two project areas have been identified for complete elimination of child labour. Special attention has been given to rigorous implementation of Child Labour Policy of 1987. Some of the important initiatives taken in this regard include review of the working of the existing laws by the statutory Child Labour Advisory Committee and the Child Labour Technical Advisory Committee; strengthening flow of external assistance to the NGOs to undertake programmes for the benefit of children, and efforts for enlisting the employers' cooperation in industries where child labour is prevalent towards its elimination. Further, a scheme has been launched in 11 most populous cities for the welfare of street children for providing integrated community based non-institutional basic services for their care, protection and development.

Special Employment and Anti-Poverty Programmes

53 A number of special employment programmes for encouraging self and wage employment are being implemented both in rural and urban areas. These include Integrated Rural Development Programme (IRDP), Training of Rural Youth for Self Employment (TRYSEM), Jawahar

Rozgar Yojana (JRY), Nehru Rozgar Yojana (NRY) and the Scheme for Self-Employment for Educated Unemployed Youth (SEEUY). Special employment programmes are also being implemented by some of the State Governments like the Employment Guarantee Scheme (EGS) in Maharashtra and the Self Employment Scheme for Registered Unemployed (SESRU) in West Bengal.

54 In the current year, to give a fillip to employment generation, the following two new programmes have been launched: (i) Employment Assurance Scheme (EAS), and (ii) Prime Minister's Rozgar Yojana (PMRY) for the Educated Unemployed Youth.

55 The EAS is being implemented in the 1752 backward blocks in which the Revamped Public Distribution System is in operation. The scheme aims at providing 100 days of unskilled manual work to the rural poor who are seeking employment. Its funding pattern is 80:20 by the Centre and the States, respectively. It is targeted at the poor especially during the lean agricultural season in rural areas. The works undertaken are run departmentally and no contractors are hired. Part of the wages may be paid in terms of foodgrains.

56 The PMRY scheme for Educated Unemployed Youth has been designed to provide employment to more than one million persons by setting up seven lakh micro-enterprises during the Eighth Five Year Plan in industry, service and business. The scheme covers urban areas only during

1993-94 and would subsequently cover both the urban and rural areas. From 1994-95 onwards, the present Scheme for Self-Employment for Educated Unemployed Youth (SEEUY) will also be integrated into PMRY. The target for 1993-94 is to assist 40,000 beneficiaries; from 1994-95 to 1996-97, the annual target will be 2.2 lakh beneficiaries. Projects up to Rs. 1 lakh are covered under the scheme in the case of individuals. If two or more eligible persons enter into a partnership, projects with higher cost can be assisted provided the share of each person in the project-cost does not exceed Rs. 1 lakh. An entrepreneur is required to contribute 5 per cent of the project-cost as margin-money in cash. Unemployed educated persons in the age group 18-35 are eligible for assistance subject to certain educational, income and other criteria. Preference is being given to those belonging to weaker sections and women. The scheme envisages 22.5 per cent reservation for Scheduled Castes/ Scheduled Tribes and 27 per cent for Other Backward Classes (OBCs). The loan does not require any collateral guarantee. The Government of India provides subsidy at the rate of 15 per cent of the project-cost subject to a ceiling of Rs. 7,500/- per entrepreneur.

The scheme also envisages training for entrepreneurs after the loan is sanctioned.

57 Broad achievements of the special programmes are given in Table-9.11.

58 Bringing about qualitative improvements in the special programmes involving better targeting, judicious selection of assets, cost-effectiveness, infrastructural support, and integration with sectoral and area development plans has acquired added significance in the present-day context. It must be emphasised that the special employment programmes play only supplementary and short-term role, and the lasting solution to the problems of unemployment and poverty lies in faster generation of productive employment in the growth process. Slow employment growth in the past is partly due to the growth of capital-intensive methods of production which was, to some extent, induced by the protective labour laws. Other factors responsible for slow growth of employment are mismatch between skill requirements and employment opportunity, low productivity, occupational shifts from artisans to unskilled labour and declining trend of labour absorption in

agriculture in the past. It is expected that the ongoing economic reforms with emphasis on private participation in the growth process and the expansion of investment and production would give a fillip to the growth of employment in the medium-term.

Outlook

59 A marked change in programme thrusts and prioritisation within social sectors is discernible in recent years, but the desirability of its immediate and full manifestation cannot be overemphasised. In view of the critical nature and large magnitude of the problems, a massive effort is required - in terms of financial investment, organisation, and efficient delivery systems. Various expert studies have also brought out that there has to be a pooled social effort involving both government and non-government organisations.

60 Although much higher budgetary allocations to social sectors are desirable, but to become sustainable, even at levels envisaged in the Eighth Plan, they would need to be accompanied by a substantial fiscal correction. As in our Constitution, the various components of the social sectors belong mostly to the State List (e.g., Public health and sanitation; Water supplies) and the Concurrent List (e.g., Education; Population control and family planning; Social security and social insurance; Employment and un-

employment; Welfare of labour), the required fiscal correction must be carried out at the level of both the Centre and the States to provide adequate resources for investment in the social sectors. Further, a reorientation of priorities in expenditure in favour of primary education and basic health will entail a reduction of existing subsidies to higher education and non-basic health facilities and cost-recovery in these public services from those who can afford to pay for them, are required. The fact that the gains from investment in social sectors accrue with a considerable time lag, reinforces the need for sustainability of expenditure on them at significantly higher levels. This can be ensured only in a regime of prudent fiscal management.

61 While considering improvement in organisational structure at the field level, the synergistic relationship among various components of social sectors (e.g., among education, health and nutrition, and family welfare) on the one hand, and the programmes of poverty alleviation and employment, on the other, cannot be lost sight of. This would necessitate composite programme thrusts on target groups which are mostly common. The emphasis laid down by reports of NDC Committees and other expert studies on micro-planning, involving Panchayati Raj institutions and the NGOs, holds the key to the needed field level coordination, improved targeting and cost-effectiveness of the social sector programmes.
